
Love at first book by Jenn McKinlay (book)




MYSTERY

Two sides to every murder by Danielle Valentine


This book tells the story from 2 points of view interspersed with details about the murder. There is a twist at the end I did not see coming. I couldn't put the book down and read it in 2 days.

The Martian by Andy Weir






NON-FICTION

A molecule away from madness: tales of the hijacked brain by Sara Manning Peskin


The author teaches clinical neurology at the University of Pennsylvania. Peskin weaves personal stories from her patients and their families into the history of researchers uncovering these illnesses.

The Chancellor: The Remarkable Odyssey of Angela Merkel by Kati Marton




Lunar New Year Love Story by Gene Luen Yang and LeUyen Pham








AUDIO BOOKS

It is a fantastic fantasy story about a young princess finding herself and her place.


